#### Whanganui conference campaigns for NZ wool

Tom O'Sullivan is the General Manager Advocacy for 'Campaign for Wool NZ.'. He recently spoke to members of the NZ Wool Classers Association at their North Island Conference held in Whanganui.

While stating bluntly that the wool industry is in crisis, he remains very optimistic about the huge potential of wool.

But right now, the figures are not good. There is no return for strong wool. It actually costs the farmer \$1 per kilo to have their sheep sheared. With one million kilos per year, this means wool is costing farmers \$1 million.

Tom says, "Farmers can be tempted to cut costs, avoid using a rousie or wool handler and have it packed away, sold at whatever price, but this is not the way to go. The best wool gets the best

price." While fine merino wool hits the headlines, about 85% of New Zealand wools are strong (thicker) wool from crossbred sheep, and there is renewed hope for the revival of these wools.

He pointed to the "build environment - carpets, rugs, insulation, furniture, drapes, wall coverings - even lamp shade and the arts," where there is new interest as well as keen interest in using wool in planes and cruise ships. There is a swing away from synthetic carpets, especially by younger peo-

He gave the example of

showed that to carpet an average 3-bedroom size house in the UK with synthetic carpet (he prefers the use of 'plastic' – "call them for what they are.") is the equivalent of using 22,000 supermarket plastic shopping bags.

Plastic comes from oil and fossil fuels, and many big brands no longer want to be associated with that. "We have the biggest tailwind for natural products, and we need to get the beautiful story of wool out

Why hasn't the word got out there before the industry hit crisis point? Tom admits that the NZ Wool was poorly run by "old, stale and pale men. Massive research was being carried out, but there was not enough development of new products.

Things are changing, and Tom gave the example of T&R Interior Systems, which has developed wool tiles for walls as well as woollen acoustic panels. It has taken three years to perfect, but they are ready to go into commercial production with "huge demand overseas. Look at it this way - we have one

floor and four walls."

Another reason for the lack of promotion of wool has been the fragmentation of those in the wool industry. Tom says, "When I joined in 2019, I was horrified. It was so confusing. Since then, we have launched 'Partner Portal' promoting networking and industry certification and have received financial support from the Ministry of Primary Industries.

Campaign for Wool NZ is part of a worldwide campaign (UK, Australia, Canada, USA and South Africa) with King Charles as its patron. Tom has a dedicated Com's/PR Team, planned monthly activities and an active social media presence. Recently, Tom has been on 7 Sharp, National Radio, and the campaign has been featured on Country Cal-

push for education about wool in primary schools (they have two containers are taken to schools and are booked out till the end of 2024), secondary schools starting next year, and a programme directed at tertiary students encouraging them to consider careers in design using wool.

Tom has also overseen a the Ministry of Education announced that 600 rural schools were to be carpeted with synthetic carpets. New Zealanders were up in arms, but Tom pointed out that out of 12 tenders. only one promoted wool carpets, and their tender had to be dismissed as they didn't supply the required data. "The Ministry literally could not award them the tender."

#### Local needle exchange programme saving lives

The Needle Exchange programme in New Zealand was set up in the 1980s. Its purpose is to swap a used needle with a sterile one for those who are injecting themselves with drugs, either

casually or through to those who could be doing it twice a day.

By doing this, they are preventing the likelihood of drug users getting one of the blood-borne viruses such as Hepatitis C or

HIV/AIDs. As manager of the local exchange programme, Nick Hall says, "It is about harm reduction. Prior to the programme, drug addicts would get needles from wherever they could –

hospitals and vets – and reuse them."

Nick and the other two staff have "lived experience" with drugs, and any advice they give is peer-based. As Nick says, "Drug users are more likely to listen to someone who has been there, done that." Nick adds, "I have been on methadone for 25 years." (Methadone is a synthetic opioid that gives you 24 hours of relief from wanting to take drugs)

The system is simple. The Exchange Programme is supplied through the Ministry of Health, and two months ago, the minimal charge of 50 cents was dropped. "Every dollar spent on this programme probably saves \$10 to \$20 down the track," comments Nick.

Those who use the services are of both sexes and all ages. "It includes all ethnicities, although the amount of Māori and Pasifika seem far less presented than you might think although (IV) meth use seems to be changing that," advises Nick, "although meths use is starting to break into these groups now."

Nick adds, "Not every-

Nick adds, "Not everyone who comes to see us is the type of person you expect." He is particularly keen to reach out to secondary school students to advise them of the dangers of drug use. They have an after hours

sending machine that can be accessed via a 4-digit password which staff can provide. Wellington uses a spectrometer to let people know if their drugs are cut, or if they are not what they think. "Here we have collaborated with a group called "Know Your Stuff" to provide the same service," advises Nick, "hopefully that will become a regular occurrence. We give out Naloxone (a drug used to reverse the effects of an opioid overdose) and train people who are interested in its use.

"We also have strips which detect the presence of Fentanyl (a drug roughly 1000 x more powerful than morphine, which caused a number of overdoses a few months ago here in Whanganui) and give out a lot of leaflets and advice regarding everything from overdose and laws surrounding drug use, to vein care and where your nearest exchange is located."

It is a totally confidential service – no questions asked. But if users want to discuss their issues, the

staff are happy to engage with them. Nick emphasises this is dependent on the drug user, new or long-time users and what drugs they are using. They are able to pass on details if permission is given, to other organisations able to help.

All used syringes are eventually "melted down to a grey sludge" and are incapable of harming anyone.

As to the question of whether supplying drug users with clean needles encourages them to continue drug taking, Nick replies, saying, "People will always find a way, whether it is injecting, smoking, snorting or sniffing." He has been the manager for two years, and the numbers have been steady in that time, although with an increase in the Meth users.

They also run a bi-weekly clinic with a nurse testing for Hepatitis C. (Hepatitis C infects the liver, which in a worst-case scenario can lead to liver failure)

Earlier this year, TCLT Community Team) opened the River Valley Community Hub, the first of its kind, located at Mokonui Road in Rānana. This was a huge celebration following five years of community engagement, with the support of external stakeholders. Following a true community led model, TCLT partnered with Sport Whanganui, Ministry of Primary Industries and Department of Internal Affairs to bring this dream to fruition.

However, it was fortunate that TCLT were introduced to Dr. Praveen Thadigiri from Living Waters. His team was willing to take on the challenge to run a rural clinic out of the Community Hub. The Living Waters team has a passion for the health of their community and currently operates two GP clinics, two rest homes and a skin cancer clinic, all located in Whanganui.

The clinic operates fort-nightly for those residents that have registered for this service.

Continued from page 1 The public response has had its impact on NZ Wools and on the Government, who are keen to ensure the inability to provide the EPD (Environment Product Declaration) will not happen again.

But the driver of a change to using natural products will be the consumer, and once that happens, businesses will respond. Wool has in Tom's view, "a huge opportunity to take advantage of the massive global move from plastics to sustainable and natural products." But, He adds, "We will succeed only if we have good prod-

ucts." The price for wool is increasing.

There is strong industry support, and Tom points to Bremworth as "probably the best example of a company committed to strong wool. A couple of years ago, 60% of their products were synthetic carpets. Today, 100% is wool."

Tom adds that he enjoys promoting wool as "it is sustainable, biodegradable, and the animal is unharmed when

shorn of its wool."

#### Nanogirls promoting science at Whanganui Intermediate

The Nanogirls website states: "We're on a mission to ensure everyone, everywhere, has the opportunity to develop a love of STEM—Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths!

Dr Debbie Lovegrove from Nanogirls was in Whanganui on Friday, 3 November, spreading that love to students from Fordell, Whanganui Intermediate and St Georges. The RCP turned up to watch.

The session started off with a bang or at least fire (without the brimstone). After briefly mixing some ingredients, Debbie put the substance on her arm and put herself on fire. She did warn the students not to do this at home, and she later explained that because she put her hands in cold water beforehand, her hand could not get burnt.

When she asked whether she should repeat the experiment and "put myself in danger for you once again," there was a chorus 'yeah.'

Debbie or 'Debbiesaur-ous' (all Nanogirls have scientific nicknames) studied Palaeontology (think Jurassic Park) and Geology and told the students that "anyone can be a scientist." To demonstrate, she asked three volunteers to blow up a

balloon, tie it and then try to put a skewer through both sides of the balloon without popping it.

They did start by putting it through where they had tied the balloon, but each failed to get it through both sides. The clue, as she demonstrated it, is not to blow up your balloon too much; go through the top and go directly through. It doesn't work every time, but it did this

#### Construction of hybrid vessels now possible with Q-West's move to port

the benefits Te Pūwaha and the revitalisation of Whanganui's Port will bring, it is clear that proiect partners O-West Boat Builders stand to gain a lot. They are also putting a huge amount on the line. As project partners, O-West has agreed to take on a loan of \$11 million to move their operation downstream so they can increase their capabilities and essentially keep their business and their staff in Whanganui.

When Q-West moves to the Whanganui Port site, they will have a purposebuilt facility alongside a mobile boat hoist with a 380-tonne lift capacity for new builds, repairs, and maintenance services within the Port.

The new facilities will allow for the first of Auckland Transport owned ferries to be

moved on site in February 2025, in time for the installation of 168 lithiumion batteries.

Q-West Chief Executive Colin Mitchell says, 'The lithium-ion batteries make the vessel significantly heavier than a similar sized diesel-only vessel, which is why the vessel hoist is integral to this build."

"If we were to install the batteries at the current site, we would be unable to hoist it into the water on our slipway; it just couldn't handle the weight."

The two Auckland electric hybrid vessels are part of a project spearheaded by Fullers360 to decarbonise their fleet of ferries. They will be the first hybrid passenger vessels in New Zealand.

The project is a multiparty collaboration between Q-West, Fullers 360,

Incat Crowther (based in Australia) and Hamilton Jet to complete the vessel on behalf of Auckland

Transport.
At 34 metres in length and a width of 9.5 metres, both Auckland Transport ferries will have the capacity to carry 300 passengers.

The move to the Whanganui Port site will also provide opportunities to employ new staff, with Q-West indicating an additional 30 could be employed, along with an estimated 80 additional roles with neighbouring businesses.

"Boats need to be refitted and maintained; our customers are more than willing to come back to us for this service, however, in recent years this has become more difficult with the high silt levels in the river and our inability to lift the boats out.

#### Sports Talk

Secondary School Sports Awards

It was another glittering occasion at Cullinane College last Wednesday as the 2023 Mitre 10 Mega Whanganui Secondary School Sports Awards winners were announced.

As strange as it may seem nowadays in our post-Covid world, these were the first awards since 2019 that all nominees had the advantage of full, uninterrupted seasons in their various codes to be considered for prizes.

The award criteria will consider the exploits of these athletes across an October to October timeframe rather than the January to December calen-

As such, the judging panel considered about 65 nominations of individuals, teams, coaches and officials across 13 categories, which included the return of the 'International' sportsman and sportswoman awards, which naturally, due to Covid restric-tions had not been included in the 2022 edition, due 2021-22 summer athletes being domiciled domesti-

These two categories proved the toughest to judge – the panel was unable to split the achievements of judo practitioner Lucas Munn and and inline speed skater Micky Zhang, both of Whanganui High School for Junior Sportsman of the Year.

Munn won gold in his Cadet division at the Queensland International Judo Championships, while Zhang claimed two golds at the Oceania Inline Speed Skating Championships.

The International Junior Sportswoman was speed skater Gabriella Valentine of Whanganui Girls College, who also competed at the Oceania championships and earned two golds and two bronzes.

It was a similar story in the Senior International Sportsman of the Year, with WHS's Chase Morpeth once again winning the prize, after he came 11th in the 10km Elimination Race at the World Championships in



monitoring scientist Ian Hurst says staff monitor the levels of faecal indicator bacteria and potentially toxic algae (cyanobacteria) in the

"We test for E.coli at freshwater sites and Enterococci at coastal sites to measure faecal contamination," she says.

"The presence of these bacteria in waterways suggests other pathogens, which are harmful to humans, may also be present. E.coli and Enterococci are not visible to the human eye, so we take samples and send them to an independent lab for processing.

"Potentially toxic algae includes cyanobacteria, which appears as black mats on rocks in rivers and as green scum in and above water in lakes. This algae can be toxic to animals and people.

"Staff use a bathyscope (underwater viewer) to observe these algae n rivers. For lakes, a sample of the water is taken and examined with a micro-

scope.
"Coming into contact with water where these organisms are present in sufficient quantities can lead to conditions such as gastroenteritis, respiratory illness, and ear and

skin infections. We update the LAWA website once we get the results, so people know which sites are suitable for swimming.



"Please stay out of water if it has been raining heavily within the last 72 hours, as this can create faster-flowing water and contribute to higher levels of faecal contamination.

"It is important to check any swim spot before swimming, but especially after heavy rain, as things may have changed beneath the surface since you were last there. It is especially important to

check for large objects. "Rivers and beaches across Aotearoa New Zealand can be unpredictable and their power easy to underestimate. Do not enter the water alone, actively supervise children, and stay out if you are not a confident swimmer.

"Also avoid swimming close to cliff faces in case of slips, which can occur anytime. Finally, call 111 during any emergency at a waterway.





#### Waverley A&P Show history

The first Show was on 21 January 1909, when W.W. Wilson was President, but there were years when the show could not be run due to the world wars and epidemics from the flu epidemic in 1918/19 through to Covid, which forced the cancellation of the show for the past three years.

The date was moved to November for the 1957 Show to bring it into line with A&P Shows being held at a similar time in Whanganui, Hawera and Stratford.

Last year, for its 100th the Association prepared a 'Memorial Book' of the Show's history, which was given to invited guests and past members. Association President, Leanne Morrison interviewed several members for the book and for a video that ran in a couple of places at the Show. She said, "The shows created many happy memories for so many. They were special and important to the community. Many locals still have treasured photos, newspaper articles and prize cards as mementos."

A&P Shows have been cut back or dropped throughout the country, and even in Whanganui, the Show will be mainly a horse one. All the more reason to head up to Waverley and check out the attractions of a good A&P Show.

Lotto NZ is going local in a new campaign showcasing the mahi of everyday Kiwi achieving extraordinary things in their communities, with help from lottery funding.

#### 300 Lotto Horizons Notes

Early 2024, we will be setting our Long-Term Plan (LTP) 2024 – 2034; this is the document that sets the goals and direction of the Regional Council (Horizons) for the next ten years. I would encourage you to keep an eye out for what is proposed in this document, as it will affect you.

For some it will just affect the level of service you do or don't receive, for others it will affect the amount of rates you pay. For most of you it will do both, affect the level of service you do or don't receive from Horizons and the amount of rates you will pay.

We are in changing

we are in changing times, with the change

of government who have signalled a more handsoff approach to local politics, letting more decisions be made at a local level, the freeing up of red tape RMA; we could also see regional and district councils combined.

At the risk of repeating myself, I have made it clear I stand for Rate Restraint; that does not mean - no rate rises, but it does mean evaluation of all the options you have and making informed decisions about what stays in your budget, what new level of service should be added, and most importantly what services can be withdrawn or scaled down to balance the needs (Not just the wants) of our community.

In my view, council has a reluctance to scale back any level of services but is quick to add them on, which in turn is why we have the ever-increasing rate costs, well ahead of inflation.

A personal view with Cr David Cotton

Just to give you a heads up on the type of decisions you will face. The Tide Bus Service —

The Tide Bus Service—should this go from a trial to a fully funded service in Whanganui, there is also a push to extend the level of our bus service into other areas of Whanganui.

Should Horizons be looking to fund Iwi for the work they do? For example, the Port Project is approximately \$500k; or should this be funded directly from Central

Government? I look forward to your feedback when the LTP document is released early 2024.



# Scott Maury - new skin specialist at Whanganui Skin Cancer Centre

Scott Maury practised medical and surgical dermatology in the United States for over 20 years, but in July he and his wife Karen and children came to Whanganui, where Scott is the skin specialist at the Whanganui Skin Cancer Centre at 163 Wicksteed Street

He has an extensive background in Dermatology as a Physician Associate. Physician Associates are licensed clinicians who practice medicine in every speciality and setting and is one of 40 practising PAs in New Zealand. This experience includes lecturing for the PA programme at Saint Louis University and speaking for the Society of Dermatology Physicians Associates while being a member of the Society of Dermatology Physician Associates and the New Zealand Physician Associate Society.

"I chose to focus on dermatology as it made sense

to me. I could recognize patterns and easily understood the concepts. I also like the mix of young to older patients, from doing skin checks to removing growths."

Before coming to New Zealand, he and Karen discussed the pros and cons and then had an exploratory holiday here. During that time, he also had interviews in Palmerston North and Auckland, but they chose Whanganui as they were impressed with the city, and both of them had job offers.

"We like the slower pace of life where almost everything is only 10 minutes away. Opportunities for the children, especially educationally, are great, and Wellington is not that far away."

Scott recommends adults have a skin check every year, pointing out that there are many different kinds of skin cancers – both melanoma and non-melanoma. Melanomas are the least common but are the most dangerous.

As the business grows, he expects they will do more work in general dermatology.

You enrol directly with the school or kura Contact them to find out their enrolment process and to get their enrolment forms.

#### Documents for enrolling Check with the school

or kura to see what paperwork they want. They will want things like:

· a copy of your child's

birth certificate or passport as proof of age

- · a copy of their immunisation certificate (this is in the back of your Well Child book or ask your family doctor for a copy)
- · medical information including your doctor's contact details
- · any legal documents, for example custody or access agreements the school should know about
- · if your child has been enrolled in early childhood education, their National Student Number (NSN), and ECE leaver's record
- · contact details your family phone numbers and address and someone the school or kura can call in an emergency if they can't get hold of you.

#### Can I enrol my child at any school I like?

Not always. If the school has an 'enrolment scheme', in other words, is zoned, this gives them the authority

#### Three Whanganui reps of NZ Women's Roller Hockey team return from China

The New Zealand Women's Roller Hockey team (and Men's and U-19 teams) have just returned from an international qualifying competition in Beijing, China. They in-cluded three Whanganui women reps - co-captain Jemma Bates and 15-year-old Whanganui High School students Siobhan Pitkethley and Michaela

The good news is that although they were 4th out of five teams (the others were China, India, Japan and Australia), they qualified for next year's World's, to be held close

to Rome, Italy, in August. Jemma is well travelled but it was Michaela's 1st trip out of New Zealand while Siobhan had previously been to Australia. China is not an easy introduction to overseas travel, as the two soon experienced. Initially, it was the smog that hit them. "Each morning, we would check air quality before travelled two hours to where we played the

games," explains Jemma. 'It was always don't get involved in physical exercise out of doors.'

Their hardest game was against Japan, losing heavily. "Ironically, we played really well says

Jemma, but the Japanese had been training full time in Spain.

They had a good relationship with the Australians, with both teams cheering for the other. It must have worked in their games with China, which

they won by a big margin. Both the New Zealand Men's and the Under-19 Men's team qualified, winning 6th out of 8 and 3rd out of 5, respectively.

The women's game is strong in Whanganui, with der 19 mixed team, two to 3 under 14 teams and two under 11 teams. There are tournaments every 6 to 8 weeks in New Plymouth, Motueka, Auckland. Hastings, Wellington, and Whanganui.

The team was able to do some hurried sightseeing on the last day, visiting the Great Wall and viewing Tiananmen Square in Beijing.
While Roller Hockey

NZ supplied their kit and gear, the NZ coach gifted all members new gloves and knee pads, and World Skating also subsidized their involvement, team members still had to contribute \$3,500 each. With a lot of fund raising, the Whanganui members were able to whittle this down to only \$200 each.

But it is back to school for all three – Jemma teaches art and photography at Whanganui Girls College - until preparations begin in earnest for the Worlds next year.
