# Sophi Reinholt has a close connection to Middle East conflict

Sophi Reinholt probably has a closer connection to and understanding of the Middle East, including the current Israel/Palestine issue, than most in Whanganui.

Her mother, a kindergarten teacher, helped to establish four kindergartens in Palestinian refugee camps in Syria. She remembers when "She took me to a two-week long Summer Camp for orphaned Palestinian children. They worked on art projects and performances

ma they had experienced." "These children em-braced me as one of their own, and the teachers embraced me as one of their students. They showed me resilience, courage, determination, ingenuity, and kindness, unlike anything I have encountered since.

"These were my forma-tive years. They set my moral compass. I became obsessed with politics. Kids can see injustice, especially when it is right in front of them.'

Sophi and her husband, Mark Russell, came to live in Whanganui about two years ago. They have two children. Together, they make websites, do videography and graphic design work. Sophi says, "We love the community and consider ourselves lucky to be here.' Sophi is horrified at the

current conflict and points out that while the Israeli Government claims to be focused on hunting down Hamas operatives, less than 1% of those killed

in Gaza, according to Israeli figures, are those operatives. The rest of the 15,000 plus killed are civilians.

She finds it hard to believe that Israel, which has one of the most sophisticated militaries in the world, does not have the capability not to bomb hospitals, refugee camps and even ambulances.

While the situation in Gaza hits the headlines every day, what is happening in the other part of Palestinian land - the Israelioccupied West Bank - is also a tragedy in the making, according to Sophi.

Since October 6, over 3,000 Palestinians in the West Bank have been rounded up with a current death toll of over 200. Palestinians here live under Israeli martial law and many of those put in prison are children as young as 13 convicted of throwing stones at the Israeli soldiers.3

The Israeli government has built a wall, over 700

'in parts is twice the height of the old Berlin Wall. All Palestinian areas are under constant surveillance, and their movements are controlled by the Israeli military. Palestinians can even be identified by their car number plates.

Currently, over 700,000 Israeli settlers are living in the West Bank, settlements condemned by the International Court of Justice as being a "violation of International Law," and as their numbers grow, "Palestinians are again

scared of being pushed out and never being able to return to their homeland,' Sophi explains. "Israel has been dropping leaflets over the West Bank warning them to leave. There is no right of return.'

Sophi points out that criticism of the Israel Government and its actions is not anti-Semitic. Just like criticism of the Myanmar government

Sophi Reinholt is not anti-Buddhist and criticism of the Indian Government not

anti-Hindu. When the RCP met Sophi, she was wearing the traditional Palestinian keffiyeh, like a scarf that can cover the head and face, worn by both men and women. She

The CEO of Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga, officially unveiled two plaques on 2 December. The first plaque was

to a large gathering of Bushy Park Tarapuruhi Forest Trust members, Whanganui Regional Heritage Trust members and MP Carl Bates. The homestead, built in 1906 for Frank Moore, a wellknown Hereford cattle and racehorse breeder, was designed by the architect Charles Tilleard Natusch. It is a Category 1 Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga listed building. Upon Moore's death in

1962, the home and 220 acres of surrounding bush were gifted to Forest and Bird. In 1995, management of the site was handed to Bushy Park Homestead and Forest Trust. The homestead is leased out to Dale Pullen and provides accommodation, meals and function rooms. An environmental education centre was established in the stables and a predator-free fence has been added

flourishing. The second unveiling was at Whanganui's first public museum, now known as the Whanganui's Musicians Club and previously the Savage Club. Built in 1893, 130 years ago, this is the second oldest "civic" building in Whanganui and was built as the Wanganui Public Museum' to house the collection developed by Samuel Drew, a well-known local watchmaker and jeweller who had a keen interest in natural history and who had been making his collection available at his family premises By 1891 there was growing interest in establishing a Museum in Whanganui, and in 1892 a Museum Committee was formed, and Drew's collection was purchased by the Borough Council

for £600. The plaques are a local project adopted by the Whanganui Regional Heritage Trust as part of a national initiative by Historic Places Aotearoa (HPA), which is a national heritage advocate for independent heritage groups.

Heritage Trustee Helen Craig has led the local Blue Plaques project, working closely with Trustee Ann McNamara to deliver the plaques.

general parking spaces at certain times of the day. Sarah O'Hagan says businesses along Guyton Street have been advised about the upcoming changes, and for the most part have been very enthusiastic.

"Stakeholders along central Guyton Street have been advocating for safety improvements for a long time now, particularly for the Wicksteed Street intersection. So there's actually a lot excitement about the new roundabout which will make that intersection safer and less confusing. We've also heard a lot of positive feedback about the fact that our new road lavout involves virtually no car park loss - despite the introduction of attractive new urban design features.

O'Hagan says there will be more changes in early 2024, with road resurfacing and the installation of new urban design features including seating, improved lighting,

green spaces. "One of the key things about this project is it's a trial - and everything we install is designed to be semi-permanent and removable. So, if aspects of the new streetscape aren't quite working, or we receive community feedback saying we could make improvements with certain tweaks, we'll have the ability to make changes over the course of the trial."

The Guyton Street revitalisation project is 90 percent funded by Waka Kotahi NZ Trans port Agency through its 'Streets for People' funding programme. The programme encourages councils to work with their local communities to trial streetscape improvements, enhance safety for pedestrians and cyclists, and make streets more inviting, people-friendly spaces to visit.

## **Community News** Harmony preserved: Historic grand piano loaned to Museum Golf results 1st December 2023 Fri-

By Karen Hughes Christmas has come early for the Whanganui Regional Museum with the arrival of a grand piano made by the renowned German-American company, Steinway & Sons. The piano is on loan for one year from the New Zealand Opera School thanks to the generosity of Executive Chairman and Director of the school, Donald Trott, ONZM, JP.

The seven-foot Steinway Grand Piano was recently donated to the New Zealand Opera School by Mr Simon Rutherford of Parnell, in memory of his partner Dr Rosemary Jane Horrocks.

Donald Trott had known Rosemary Horrocks for many years. "Rosie was a doctor. and a great supporter of the arts. Not only visual arts, but particularly opera and ballet. I knew Rosie very well from my directorship of New Zealand Opera Company Ltd in Auckland. She was a wonderful woman and through her practice in Parnell, very highly regarded."

Simon Rutherford, a friend and associate of Donald's, also gifted a harp to the New Zealand Opera School. "Simon has been very supportive of the school in his own

particular way." A Model B 1896 edition, the Steinway grand piano has undergone full renovation before being transported directly from the South Island to the Museum, all facilitated by Donald Trott and Executive Assistant to the NZ Opera School, Debbie Macpherson. It is now situated in the Museum's

atrium space. "My whole motive is to enhance our artistic community. That's what the piano is there for." "When you think about

it now, we've got a Steinway grand piano in the Museum, we've got a Steinway grand piano in the concert chamber at Whanganui War Memorial Centre, we've got a Steinway grand piano on the stage of the Royal Whanganui Opera House, and Helen Collier's wonderful piano is being donated to the Sarjeant Gallery. At Whanganui Collegiate School, in the Big School, which is used a lot for events and concerts, they've got a full-size Steinway grand piano. We're quite well off."

At the Museum, the piano will feature in a performance by NZ Opera School students in January, when the school celebrates its 30-year anniversary. As well, it will be utilised for other

events and special occasions at the Museum. Outside of events, and during normal Museum opening hours, proficient players may request to play the piano.

"Whilst in my mind it was nice to have the piano in the museum for our concert, there will be so many others that will have the opportunity to use it. Even if they are not accomplished players - even if they want to play Chopsticks the piano won't mind.' Whanganui Regional

Museum Pou Ārahi/Director, Bronwyn Labrum said the loan was a generous offer from the NZ Opera School. "We're delighted to have the piano because it enables us to support the Opera School and host recitals. It also enables us to have other events that take advantage of the fantastic acoustics in the Museum atrium. We look forward to further collaborations with the NZ Opera School." On Wednesday 10th

January at 1pm, Aotearoa NZ Opera School students will perform a recital in the Museum, to celebrate 30 years of the NZ Opera School. The recital will include four singers, accompanied by Bruce Greenfield. Visit operaschool.org.nz for ticketing information.





Short term accomodation - 49 Brunswick Rd, Whanganui

## Wai Ora Christian Community Trust open another short-term accommodation two-bedroom home

In recent years, the Wai Ora Christian Community Trust at 49 Brunswick Road has been building healthy, affordable homes, using Structural Insulated Panels (SIPs), which not only take half the time to construct compared with wood framed housing but also use only half the energy required to heat, are stronger and produce much less waste in the building process. Their agency, Te Kākano Homes, has

Their agency, Te Kākano Homes, has now built two, two-bedroom homes and three cabins on-site, sold one multipurpose classroom and ten sleepout cabins in total.

The second home was recently opened and will be used for short-term accommodation for individuals with housing needs.

This follows on from Wai Ora trialing emergency housing on-site over 2021 and 2022. The demand was such that they used caravans, house buses, mobile homes and their own wharemoe, sleeping accommodation.

But as their housing report for November 2023 acknowledged, "We realised our capacity to meet the needs for high-risk occupants was modest and Wai Ora would be better to offer accommodation within a programme that already holds a mentoring service."

One of those programmes is their 'Huringa Ora o Wāhine' training programme for female students, which offers "support for individuals who encounter obstacles in securing long-term employment by fostering their personal development and employment goals." They are now able to offer accommo-

They are now able to offer accommodation in their three cabins on-site, providing the participants with stable housing and security while they complete their course.

The new two-bedroom home will complement the three cabins and will also be used for supported short-term accommodation for individuals with housing needs.

This home has been predominantly funded by the Whanganui Community Foundation, Four Regions Trust and Catalytic Foundations. Other grants and donations are assisting with the fit-out of the cabins and home.

Project Manager Eddie Churton says, "Our next pressing need is to upgrade a shared facility to have its own kitchen and dining/lounge area expressly for cabin occupants."

The 'soft opening' on Wednesday, 29 November, was attended by the Mayor, the local MP, representatives from the sponsors, members of the Wai Ora Board and others representing the architects and building suppliers.

In the past two years, Wai Ora has provided 1,268 bed nights, and now they can provide short-term supported accommodation for up to six individuals.



## It is dangerous to leave your dogs locked in the car over summer

As much fun as it can be to take your pup in the car along on errands, its safety comes first, and before you decide to keep the dog inside the car, espe-cially in summer, think about these facts first.

· Regardless of the temperature outside, a car's internal temperature can rise up to 5° to 8° in minutes.

· Just a small additional increase in a dog's body temperature can cause heatstroke.

• 15 minutes is all it takes for a dog to die of heatstroke.

· Cars, even parked in a shaded spot, can still heat up to dangerous levels.

In enclosed vehicles, dangerous microclimate conditions can develop due to the lack of air movement, and this can result in reduced latent heat exchange for animals.

Early signs of heat stroke in dogs include panting, red or dark

gums and tongue, confusion and unsteadiness leading to collapse, diarrhoea, vomiting and even seizuring leading to coma. If the dog is not cooled and treated by a veterinary surgeon quickly, the condition

can be fatal. If you notice a dog left in a car under dangerous conditions — keeping in mind that an outside temperature of just 20 degrees is hot enough for the inside of a car to become dangerous your first step should be to locate the owner of the car. Take down the car's make, model and license plate, and ask someone inside the business to help track down the owner.

If they can't be found, or if they continue to ignore the dog, your next step should be to call the authorities.

Keep in mind that you should only consider breaking into a locked car to rescue a dog as a last resort. It's gener-

## **Community News** Council identifies six-point plan to respond to cost pressures

Whanganui District Council's elected members explored budget options for the Long-term Plan 2024-34 and discussed a six-point plan to lower rates increases in a livestreamed long-term plan workshop on Tuesday, 5 December. Whanganui Mayor An-

drew Tripe says, "Look-ing over budgets in recent weeks, we've been very aware that cost of living pressures are still affecting many households. As you'll know this situation is not unique to Whan-ganui – the economic pain is being felt across the country due primarily to what I refer to as the three I's - high inflation, interest costs, and insurance."

He says, "I am writing to the new government responsible ministers for local government, infrastructure, regional development and tertiary education to advocate for pressures on local coun-

cils and ratepayers to be addressed. I support localism, which means councils need to be strengthened, not weakened, by government policies and decisions.

Mayor Andrew says like households, councils are having to look at ways to tighten the belt. "If a household is having

a tough time, what do you do? Maybe you cancel subscriptions, eat out less, and pay your credit card bill to keep it down since interest is expensive. As a council, we're also looking at ways to tighten the belt which we are undertaking through a six-point plan because we know our community wants us to be fiscally responsible and responsive to the situation we're in. This plan will position us for the future

and our growth aspirations." He says compared with councils across the country, Whanganui District Council is in a very good

"Our council has com-paratively low debt and over the years we've put the proper level of investment into maintaining assets, including our water infrastructure. We're in good shape economically, particularly in domestic tourism, and our population is growing as people realise this is an incredible

place to live. So Whanganui's future is looking bright – we just have to get through this tough economic time together. District Whanganui Council chief executive, David Langford, says the Long-Term Plan 2024-34 will provide a road-map for Whanganui for the next decade. It will set out where we aim to be by 2034, what we will need to do to get there and how much it will cost, giv-

ing a full picture of how all council activities are managed, delivered and funded.

"Whanganui is a growing city with big aspira-tions for the future. Our six-point plan identifies what we can to do to keep costs increases down in the short term, while also positioning the district for a bright future in the medium to long term. We can think of each of the six points as a lever - projected rates increases will change depending on how hard we pull each lever, David Langford says The six points are:

- population growth

- improving efficiency exploring alternative funding for projects - cutting council services

selling assets to repay debt

- identifying sources of non-rates revenue. David Langford

says the rates rise was initially estimated at close to 24 percent, but "after a lot of hard work and deferrals wherever possible, we are now down to three rates scenarios for consulta-

tion – high (14.8 percent), medium (9.5 percent) and low (5.8 percent).

"For example, to achieve the medium scenario, we'd need to find \$1M of efficiency savings, 16M of alternative funding for projects, \$2M of savings from service cuts, \$16M from selling assets to re-pay debt, \$1.2M of additional non-rates income and our population needs to grow so that our rating base increases by \$0.6M per year."

## **OBITUARY** - David Mander

The 1956 South African tourists beat Whanganui -King Country 36 - 16.






