## Grandfather's WWI diary inspires homeless man to visit 26,530 war cemeteries

Fifty-eight-year-old Australian Michael 'Mic' Whitty is cycling from Auckland to Christchurch as part of a 30-year quest to cycle to every Commonwealth War Grave cemetery in the world before VJ Day 2045. He was in Whanganui last week, staying with Terry Carmody, a friend from their days in the Australian Air

is Mic's backstory which makes his quest that much more compelling.

After the Air Force, Mic worked for British Aerospace in Saudi Arabia, earning good money. Returning to Australia he worked in IT until one day it dawned on him, he was already four levels beyond his competence level. "I recognised that

So far so good. But it I didn't know what I was talking about."

He headed off to the UK doing low stress jobs but admits, "I was back on a beer budget but still with champagne tastes." He got into 'spread betting - where you speculate on whether an asset's price will rise or fall. On Day One' he made £4000 (about \$8,200 NZ). "However, three years later I

my parents' inheritance.

He syphoned off money from his employer in the vain hope of using it to recover his losses. Failing to heed the sage advice of "when you find yourself in a hole, stop digging" it was only a matter of time until his fraud was discovered and his employment came to an end with his reputation shredded.

Because of his actions, Mic became depressed and ended up on the UK Missing Persons List for ten months, sleeping rough in the Welsh countryside. would have thought that I would have been the last person who would end up homeless. I had to reconcile my current situation with my previous attitude towards the homeless, which was "stop being lazy, get a job – now it was me sitting on a park bench for weeks at a time. It seemed relentlessly endless, and the worst bit was it would be the same again

A good friend had stored

Mic's tea chest with letters and memorabilia. Mic decided to look through them and found his grandfather's war diary from 1916. It was late 2015, and he realised that the next year would be the 100th anniversary - and what better time to go to France and retrace his grandfa-

ther's movements. It was an opportunity to break the cycle.

With the help of friends, he cobbled together the essentials and reinvigorated the confidence levels needed for such an undertaking.

As his grandfather did not reach the Western

Front until March, Mic headed off to Gallipoli by bike and train. A friend had given him a mountain bike, which got him to Turkey and back to France, where it was superseded by an abandoned old French Postman's bike

- Both the bike and Mic are literally on a 'second

wind' having both ended up on the scrap heap. When on the Gallipoli Peninsula, he picked up a brochure about the Commonwealth War Cemeteries so he decided to spend his time visiting all 33 of them – on his bike, of course.

She says the council is working in collaborative leadership with Hapū and the wider community to develop a wellbeing

strategy for Whanganui.

"The starting point for this has been conversations with our community. Along with Hapū partners, councillors and Mayor Andrew Tripe. we've attended or hosted 20 events in person over the last few months.'

Elise Broadbent says the council has interviewed community leaders and social service providers, undertaken social media pulse surveys and held workshops with various groups.

"We've been to libraries, community centres and marae, held a café discussion and community sausage sizzles and attended events such as the Kaumātua Games, the Pasifika 4 Pasifika Expo and the Fest of Cultural

"We'd like to thank everyone that completed the Vision for Whanganui survey or came to see us and share their thoughts," she says. "We're really pleased with the interest the community has shown and it's been exciting to hear and see so many people expressing the things they love about Whanganui and their ideas for the future.'

Project manager, Ro-byn Vickery shared a summary of the survey responses with the council's Strategy and Policy Committee on Tuesday, 28 November.
She says, "When peo-

ple were asked what they love and what is unique about Whanganui, the community itself was the standout and many described it as supportive. Te Awa Tupua, the Whanganui River, was central to Whanganui's unique identity. Arts and heritage also featured strongly in these sections with people mentioning Whanganui's wall art, galleries and vibrant muwall art. sic scene

"Social connection was critical to wellbeing and the environment was seen as a high priority.

"In terms of the vision our community has for Whanganui, some key themes emerged from the survey data. These were affordability of housing and the cost of living; the importance of the Whanganui River; availability of housing and service and support for the homeless: cultural and community connection and identity - and maintaining the environment with future generations in mind.'

Elise Broadbent says, "These community responses are helping us design a new strategy which will replace the Leading Edge Strategy developed in 2014. We'll bring it back to the community, along with our Long-Term Plan 2024-34, for formal consultation in April 2024.



## Grandfather's WWI diary inspired homeless man to visit 26,530 war cemeteries

page 1 Moving to France, Mic soon discovered that his grandfather didn't move around much; such was the nature of WW1. Instead, he set himself the target of cycling to the approximately 440 war cemeteries between the Belgian coast right through to Switzerland, which constituted the Western Front.

Near the end of 2016, Mic changed the 'goalposts' and extended his list of Commonwealth War cemeteries to visit all the WW1 ones in France, Belgium, Netherlands and Germany some 2000.

He is able to fund himself by doing odd jobs and hosting presenta-tions about his journey. As Terry says, "he had developed a bit of cult following in Germany, a little bit like Forest

Gump." His default accommodation is a hammock with a rainfly and sleeping bag. He prides himself on stealth camping in discreet places but is sometimes chanced upon by early morning dog-walkers. As he's packing up, conversa-tions can go either of two ways; "I'm homeless and sleeping rough" or "I'm into the 9th year of a 30-year cycle ride"

both essentially true but perhaps only one is

a conversation-stopper. This year, Mic broke out of Europe with a February flight to Bermuda, then onto the east coast of the States before crossing Canada along the Trans-Canadian Highway. "Cycling with single-speed across the Rockies and prairies was 8870 km - the distance from Sydney to Perth via Darwin."

New Year's Day finds Mic returning to Sydney and after a couple of years of doing at least one loop of Australia, he plans to head to South Africa and back up to Gallipoli before return-

ing to Europe, only to repeat the whole circumnavigation again using a different route. The ultimate goal is to visit all 26,530 Commonwealth War cemeteries as well as any other nation's War Cemeteries that he passes en-route by VJ Day, 15 August 2045 – by which

time he will be 80. Mic says, "My grand-father's diary saved his life. There is a bullet hole in the top left-hand corner. It has also saved my life."

## Box with new and used sports gear placed in Castlecliff Domain for people to borrow and play with

Play is here to stay with three 'Play Station' boxes set to be installed at parks across the Whanganui region as part of a pilot project by Sport Whanganui and REPLAY.

The Play Stations are designed to store sports balls and equipment such as basketballs, rugby balls and footballs, which are available to be borrowed for casual games with

friends and whānau. Sport Whanganui has partnered with local businesses Ali Arc and Display Associates to design and build the colourful stainless-steel boxes, which will be filled with donated new and used sports balls from the RE-

PLAY programme. "Local insights show that rangatahi lean towards less structured activities which encourage social interaction. We also wanted to provide a fun, sustainable way to activate our open spaces." says Sport Whanganui Active Community Manager

Jodie Brunger. The first Play Station will be installed at Castlecliff Domain on Friday 15 December, with plans to gift the other two boxes to the Ruapehu and Rangitīkei.

Once installed, the Play Stations will be regularly checked and topped up by Sport Whanganui with balls from REPLAY, a registered charity which collects and redistributes new and used sports gear directly to local children and families that may need help accessing gear of their own.

Denise McLean, Chief Executive Officer of RE-PLAY says "We are very appreciative of the wonderful partnership Replay has with Jodie and the team at Sport Whanganui. Together we have reconnected hundreds of donated new and used sport gear items back out into the local Whanganui community - all with the purpose of helping keep our communities active.

"We can't wait to see

the Play Stations up and going - in summertime, outdoors, with friends and whanau, being active, trying a new activity - we're stoked to help play a small part in this wonderful initiative."

Whanganui Council have already provided a new concrete pad to allow the Castlecliff Play Station to be fixed securely to the ground, and Progress Castlecliff have offered to help keep an eye on gear levels over the summer break.

## New trust to offer free music sessons for local schools

Whanganui musician and educator James Paul set up a Community Music Aotearoa Trust only two months ago and is having a public launch to create awareness on Wednesday, 20 December, from 5 to 7pm at The Vinyl Room, 56 Victoria Ave.


The Trust is a charity that offers a free service for schools that don't have regular access to recording and music tuition, especially for rural schools in the central North Island. Already over 20 schools in the region, including in Whanganui, are on board.

James and other music tutors will travel with all the necessary musical equipment to hold a full day music wānanga with the students. They will provide coaching on how to play music together in a small rock band format.

The students will experience what it feels like to make music in a rock band format with their peers, coming away with a professional sounding recording of a song that they have created together. This is a free/koha based service for schools.

The initiative is aimed at 6 to 10 year-olds.

James has a Bachelor of Music with first-class honours and has taught music for 15 years both privately and as an itinerant guitar teacher in secondary schools across New Zealand. He has also played along side members of the Black Seeds, Bic Runga, Sol3 Mio, James Morrison and



other well-known musicians.

Along with fellow musician Tim Booth, they offer music tuition and recording packages aimed at adults in their Drews Ave Studio.

## 00 years of Season's Greetings - 1950s exhibition

calligrapher Dr Peter Gilderdale has recently returned to Whanganui after spending over 30 years at AUT University's Graphic Design and Communication Design programmes. Over that time, he has collected over 5000 cards in the 'Hands Across the Sea' genre of cards and "only 200 to 300" historical Christmas cards.

Having completed a doctoral degree in the visual history of Hand Across the Sea genre of Edwardian greetings cards, he loves sharing his knowledge about New Zealand's unique design history. He has chosen some of these cards, many of them very rare, to be on display for the first time at the Alexander Heritage and Research Library

Peter will be giving a talk at the Library on this exhibition on Friday, December 15,

at 2pm and will explain Whanganui's special role in the history of New Zealand greeting card publishing.

The Hands Across the Sea genre of cards, he explains "was incredibly popular during the Edwardian period. They were cheap, with a picture on the front and were the forerunner to the Christmas cards as we know them. "They started off in the 1840s, grew more popular by the 1860s and became a craze by the 1870s. People kept scrap albums where these cards were displayed."

Messages were limited to five words, with some coming with printed text, frequently

very helpful to those not confident in the written language.

As cheap folded Christmas cards came in, they became a measure of your network how many friends you had - and were proudly displayed on mantel pieces. Christmas trees and on lines going across the room.

Whether you plan to put up a plastic or pine tree this year, Sensitive Choice New Zealand is warning people with asthma and allergies about the risk of Christmas Tree Syndrome

Christmas Tree Syndrome is an allergic reaction to real or artificial trees and can cause wheezing, sneezing, coughs, sore eyes and even potentially serious asthma attacks.

First identified in 1929. when several patients asthma worsened in a hospital after Christmas trees were put up in the ward Christmas tree syndrome is estimated to affect about 7 per cent of

Sensitive Choice New Zealand spokesperson and pharmacist, Dr Amy Chan, said what is most surprising is that both real Christmas trees as well as artificial trees have their own dangers.

"Real Christmas trees like cypress and pine can trap high amounts of pollen from other plants before they are cut down, and as the cut tree dries out, it releases the pollen which becomes airborne inside the house.

However, she warned that artificial Christmas trees can cause similar

"Artificial trees can be a safe alternative but, if used year after year, they accumulate dust or mould, which may be invisible to the naked eye.

"Even the most exciting part of the Christmas tree tradition - decorating can put you at risk too if festive decorations have become dusty in storage," she explained.

### Sensitive Choice New Zealand tips:

Live Christmas tree in vour home

- Hose down your live tree before you bring it into the house to help to wash off the allergens
- Cut 2.5cm off the bottom so you can water the tree and it will stay in a reasonable condition without drying out too quickly but remember not to try that with electric lights!
- Make sure to remove your Christmas tree after Christmas festivities are
- If you notice increased asthma or allergy symptoms, or you need your inhaler more often, move your tree outside.

Artificial Christmas tree in your home

- Give it a good shake outdoors before you put it up inside
- Unpack your tree and decorations outside

• Wipe down your artificial tree, wreaths and ornaments with a damp cloth to remove the dust

· When you pack your tree and decorations away, use airtight plastic bags and sealed boxes so they collect less dust.







Another motivation for the upgrade of the kitchen, advises Delwyn, the manager, is to have it as a possible hub in a Civil Defence emergency.

## Successful Cyclone Gabrielle recovery funding bid for Horizons region

Horizons Regional Council is thrilled to receive over \$4.2 million from the Local Government Flood Resilience Co-Investment Fund to build resilience to the impacts of climate change and recover from Cyclone Gabrielle.

Horizons group manager catchment operations Dr Jon Roygard says the council applied for two packages of work which have received the full funding requested.
"The first is an initiative

to upgrade flood forecasting and communications resilience across the region which will see improvements to early warning systems, updated flood forecasting models, new monitoring stations, radio upgrades, back-up power installations, regional flood mapping and a regional flood vulnerability

\$3.645 project which is a significant level of funding and a large contribution to the \$4.98 million needed for this work. Following discussions with Council, Horizons will look to make up the remaining funds required through its 2024-34 Long-term Plan.


includes \$640,000 of government co-funding for a \$1.2 million programme to reduce risk to people and houses in the Pohangina-Ōroua Catchment. will involve a range of resilience upgrades through the area including support for work at a number of locations where communities have been at risk, such as the Pohangina Village.

"It will also include a contribution to an options assessment for flood protection at Saddle Road and will establish a stopbank at Tōtara Reserve to protect the grounds and surrounding road infrastructure.

Dr Roygard says "It re-lieves some of the financial burden on ratepayers who have already contributed over \$9 million to Cyclone Gabrielle repairs, what they've spent privately as well.
"The work involved in



Within those strands, there have been changes and developments. In Substances, vaping is now covered and at an earlier stage, reflecting what is happening in the commu-nity. In Relationships and community, cyber wellbeing is a regular feature. Likewise, in Resilience, adapting to Covid and the changing world, has a greater focus.

Mark says, "Each school might have a different focus depending on their needs and what is happening in their schools. The beauty of travelling with all your resources is that you can make last-minute changes."

## First of the season's Beach Carnival for Surf Lifesavers

The first of the 2023/24 Surf Life Saving Beach Carnival was held recently at Ōpunakē Beach. It was attended by Whanganui and four Taranaki region clubs, Fitzroy, East End, Ōpunakē and NPOB – four very strongly competitive clubs.

Bec Sharratt from the Whanganui club says, "For a summer sport it ended up bring a bitterly cold and wet morning on the beach but that didn't deter our crew, they all got stuck in, sandy, wet and gave it a go."

"We do these carnivals to try out the skills we are coaching, to meet other clubbies, and be an active part of the wider surf lifesaving region we are in, and to experience a different beach environment to our own."

The Whanganui Club had Juniors on debut at their first carnival along with those is age groups under 8s to U13s.

Each age group has water and beach arena events. Water events start with the U8's as a run/wade/run, working up to a 200m surf swim for U11 to U13s, then a board race (with boogie boards for the U10 age groups). This is followed by a diamond event which puts the swim and board event together as one. On the beach are sprints and beach flags events.

Each club provides lifeguards to form the in-water safety team with Whanganui guards Ethan Bishop, Maddie Buchanan and Pippa Buchanan involved.

Selwyn Baxter has completed his Junior Surf Coaching course giving good coverage of all age groups, coaching with Daniel Comp, along with plenty of parent help.

Brendon Sharratt was on the job for his first day of Surf Official training. Whanganui currently doesn't have any qualified Surf Officials, so he will be an asset to the club.

"We had an exciting number of placings to take away, but most importantly we had a great bunch of kids out there being active in a way they love."

"Surf is very familyfocused. Our families are there for all the kids, which makes it a very supportive day out. Our Junior Surf programme is currently running at capacity with 70 children each Sunday at Castlecliff Beach."

"Our next Surf Carnival is Central Regions Champs for 11-14yrs on 12 January 2024, followed by our own Surf Carnival, hosting the region and beyond at Castlecliff Beach on Sunday, 21st January."

Quinn has been playing football since he was five. He is currently 23. Joining Athletic in 2015 he was soon selected for the first team and now has 95 caps. He says, "The older boys took me under their wing, and I got involved in all aspects of the club." He volunteered for 20 to 25 hours a week and helped out coaching junior teams.

He adds, "No one in the club is above anyone. We all get involved in helping out."

The focus of the job is to make sure that the club is well-positioned for future sustainability. This includes progressing the number of players signed up. Currently they have just over 500 members.

He is also responsible for encouraging sponsorships and fundraising. This will include an annual golf day at Castlecliff Golf Course. Quinn will also handle their social media, something he has already been doing increasing their numbers on Facebook from 500 to 1200.

Quinn has a Commerce degree covering Finance and Management and previously worked in the insurance industry.

The first team will be playing in the Federation League level this year, but Whanganui's chances of playing at the top level in the Central Region have been boosted by the decision to replace the Federation level with Central 2, which will start in 2025. This will include teams from the Wellington region, providing stronger competition and bridging the gap with Central



## Drews Avenue road surface design

Dear editor,

Issues regarding the Drews Avenue street's surface design in Drews Avenue was raised at a recent Alzhei-

mers Whanganui Board Meeting
The recently refurbished asmd freshly painted building in Drews Avenue are a visual delight, and art designs on the road and pavement surfaces was no doubt intended as further enhancement. However, the style of the design and its mixed colour palette presents some very serious visual and perception issues for a large group of people in our community. Included in this group are those living with dementia or with a brain injury, the visually impaired and older people in general.

The art design on the road surface of Drews Avenue is chaotic; it is very muddled and confusing, with large shapes, wiggles, squiggles, bold stripes, zigzags, and mixed colours tossed across the street. Arrows on the pavement and a wide line running alongside the street edge turns corners, leading to nothing in particular, adds to the confusion

Depth perception is the ability to see things in three dimensions, including size of and distance form. Any decrease in depth perception causes a person difficulty distinguishing between a flat surface and a raised surface, thus greatly increasing the danger of tripping or falling.

The Ocular System (the eyes) connects to the vestibular organs in the inner ear, which are responsible for balance and orientation. Too much visual stimulation for the brain to cope with affects balance. Again, increasing the danger of people tripping and faling. On top of that, with the surface design being visually too stimulating for the brain, a person with dementia can very quickly become extremely agitated and confused.

A white line for sight-impaired people generally indicates the edge of a step. Confusion reigns when confronted with multiple lines of different colours going in different directions.

Whanganui already has a high percentage of older people, and with baby boomers now reach this age group, numbers continue to rise. Consideration must be given during the planning stages as to how future street enhancements and community projects, including proposals for the Guyton St/Wicksteed Street intersection, might impact on older people and the Whanganui community at large. We ask that matters raised in this letter be given careful attention by city planners.

## Wanganui Bowling Club installs new Tiger Web Turf green named in honour of Cynthia Adams

Over two years ago, the Wanganui Bowling Club in Nelson Street experienced 48 hours of continuous rain. The drains couldn't take it, and the rainwater overflowed the green and was 3/4 up on the bank

President Russell Spence explains what happened next. "Parts of the Tiger Turf and the green underlay had raised up with pieces floating on the top. About a third of the underlay was washed away. We were left with only five of the eight bowling pitches.'

The club decided to install a Tiger Web matting green, recommended by Bowls New Zealand. After the insurance payout and successful grant applications, the club was close to meeting the \$220,000 cost and this

was achieved by some donations from club members. However, as Russell explains, "the installers discovered a 90-year-old concrete plinth underneath and in the way and so a wooden one had to be built around it." That wasn't all. The drainage system was blocked. It had been put in about 20 to 25 years ago, and it was cheaper to lay a new system than to try to clean it out. This meant another \$25,000 to be raised.

The installation was very quick, starting on the 19 September and taking 7 weeks. It has been tested and "is running very good indeed."

The huge advantage over a grass green is that the Tiger Web is open 24/7 all year round and grass maintenance is much more expensive. It is kept clean using a vacuum cleaner and a leaf blower. There is no longer any need for chemicals, which can seep into the sub

"There is very little variation in the speed of the green," Russell says, "The suggested life span is around 15 years, but we've seen other similar greens 25 years on and still looking good."

The formal opening on Sunday 3 December, pro-

duced a big surprise to at least one person as it had been kept a secret that the new greens were to be called the Cynthia Adams Green as a mark of respect to the contribution that Cynthia has made over the years. It came as a wonderful surprise to her.

"The club is the 3rd oldest surviving bowling club in New Zealand," advises Russell having started in 1886 in St Hill Street, next to the Grand Hotel. It moved to Nelson Street in the early 1900s. At the opening they used a silver jack and a wooden bowling ball from

## Whimsical tales of old Wanganui

## An old well for the Rutland Stockade

By Murray Crawford A recent news item made menton of the old well which once watered the Rutland Stockade. The plan is to make a feature of the well as part of the restoration of the Sarjeant Art Gallery. But in 1866, when the military presence in Wanganui was dwindling, a Wanganui Chronicle reader drew attention to the dangers posed by the well. "SIR,- I beg to call

your attention to a well situated at the back of the Rutland Stockade,

almost in the centre of the road, and which seems to belong to no one, but a great number of people come for water to it, and the prisoners from the gaol regularly every morning. Now, Sir, some eight

months ago I assisted to pull a soldier of the 68th regt., out of this well, and only that he got so far out of the water that he could shout, causing the dogs to bark, he would have been drowned. The night being very dark this affair passed over, and no one

took any notice of it. Again, about a fortnight ago, in the middle of the broad day, a little child, about three years of age, fell into this well, and had it not been for the exertions of two or three women, there is no doubt that the child would have been lost and might have lain in the well for days without being found.

If the well belongs to no person why not the Town Board close it up, and if it belongs to that body why not then cause a covering put over it before some one is drowned in it? Most likely some one is waiting the same as in other parts of New Zealand till they get a recommenda-



tion from a Coroner's inquest. And in conclusion I beg to say that I only send you this letter (as I deem it my duty) for the information of those who might feel interested in the matter. I am., MILES.

## Oscar Mabin making his name in cricket

raised in Hawke's Bay, but in fact is Whanganui Collegiate 1st XI allrounder and Riverview Motel Whanganui senior team prospect Os-car Mabin flew our flag at the tournament that bridges youth and adult

cricket. The men's National Under-19 Tournament is one of NZC's longest standing amateur competitions and is strongly contested by the six Major Associations each season, including Central Districts which includes Whanganui in the catchment.

The tournament, held at Lincoln University near Christchurch also has the specific purpose of identifying high-performance players, who will go on to represent New Zealand at the ICC Under 19 World Cup, which is held every two years.

Mabin follows in the footsteps of local talent like Henry Collier and Nick Blundell, who went to the tournament and played for the New Zealand U19's, with Collier going on to play at the ICC World Cup.

A tier below Under 19 level, Central Districts Under 17's, has seen the likes of Mabin's current Whanganui squad mates and brothers Shaun and

He may be born and Connor O'Leary represent, while Brett Cameron captained that side before his other passion of rugby came calling – leading him to an All Blacks test jersey and a fine career with the Crusaders and Hurricanes.

You have to go back ten years to use those five names as examples – the simple truth is we need more young players obtaining this level, if only to bring back what they learn to the local scene, if the brighter lights of international cricket don't shine on them.

Just this Wednesday, we saw the first Collegiate vs Whanganui High 1st XI match played in the better part of a decade, as part of Cricket Whanganui's Premier 1 45-over compe-

More Under 16-18 year olds playing each other on a more regular basis can only re-grow our nursery of cricket talent, which leads to the two most desirable outcomes - a senior Whanganui team we can be proud of playing well at Furlong Cup level, and a bolter or two becoming fulltime professionals with Central Districts and perhaps the Black Caps.

It wasn't the easiest start for Mabin and his Central Districts U19 squad, who opened their tournament against home side Canterbury, beaten by 23 runs on December 2th.

Mabin took 1-48 from his nine overs as Canterbury raised an imposing 301-9, and then made 14 from nine balls in the middle order as Central Districts were dismissed for 278 with seven deliveries remaining.

On December 3rd, Central Districts suffered a heavy nine-wicket loss to Wellington.

Bowled out for 150, with Mabin the second-highest scorer, making 22 from 41 balls, CD could not prevent Wellington from reaching their total in only 20 overs, with Mabin having 18 runs taken from his two overs.

It got tougher on December 5th when CD faced Auckland, beaten by a record 316 runs when Auckland made 432-9, with Mabin's figures not that bad in context, 71 runs taken from his

ten overs. CD were then bowled out for 116, Mabin not

scoring.
On December 6th, CD, without Mabin, played Otago, losing by 135 runs after being bowled out for 215,

chasing 350-7. But the squad then had back-to-back games against Northern Districts on Friday and Saturday.

Mabin returned for the first game and took 1-43 as ND were bowled out for 199, and was on five not out when CD reached 200-6 in the 44th over for a four-wicket win.

Then on Saturday, rain proved a factor as ND received the win via DLS calculations.

CD raised 314-7, Mabin finishing 14 not out, and he was bowling when ND was on 302-4 in the 45th over (rescheduled for 47 overs) when play was called
