# Alistair Fraser is promoting Digital Inclusion programmes in Whanganui

Alistair Fraser came here 20 years ago to complete a post graduate diploma in computer graphic design and instead of returning home to the Kapiti Coast, he felt Whanganui was so special he decided to stay on. The following year, he got the role of facilitating and coordinating the Whanganui Computers in Homes (CIH) programme from when it began in 2006 until 2012, then continued to work with the national CIH group until central government stopped funding in 2017.

When the Digital Inclusion Alliance Aotearoa (DIAA) started in 2018, Alistair became a contractor and team member.
He explains: "The

DIAA works collaboratively with the digital inclusion sector, providing Stepping UP programmes and resources for more than 360 'front of house' delivery partners. These programmes include Digital Steps, Better Digital Futures, Digital Skills for Seniors, DORA and Skin-

> line is huge. Whilst his work for DIAA as a digital ambassador is NZ-wide, Alistair enjoys supporting DIAA's local partners: Whanganui Libraries, Age Concern Whanganui and the Whanganui Learning Centre.

He hopes the Council will significantly strengthen and update its Digital Strategy, set in 2019 to incorporate new technologies and, in particular, generative artificial intelligence (GAI). He says, "Use of GAI has really taken off and is causing unprecedented technological disruption, and will radically transform our lives for better and worse."

Microsoft founder Bill Gates has predicted everyone will have a GAI-powered personal assistant within 5 years. Understandably Alistair says, "We need to have digital inclusion programmes in place urgently to ensure everyone has equal oppor-tunities to use developing technologies like these and of the wider benefits such as for our health with artificial-driven support apps and devices."

'It is not just about charity and ensuring those who are really needy receive help, compelling as this justification alone is. There is a huge economic outcome from digital inclusion interventions as well."

A 2021 BNZ Skills report found 700,000 adult New Zealanders – about 20% - lack the essential digital skills they need to use the internet safely and effectively.

"This is Alistair says, "This is one in every five of us. No wonder Nigel Latta's recently TV programme, 'You've been scanned' was so needed and popular."

Digital literacy hasn't mattered so much in the past, but now it has become essential for job seekers to possess at least foundation-level digital skills to work.

It is of course a worldwide issue. The World Economic Forum's Future of Jobs 2023 report, expects globally, six in ten workers will require training before 2027, but seen to have access to adequate training opportuni-

What can be done? Alistair gives the example of the Ōtautahi Community Housing Trust which manages the Christchurch City Council-owned community housing properties. It provides a free internet access programme, if required, for all tenants and free digital skills training.

In Whanganui, Alistair says, "There are around 590 social housing properties in the Whanganui region. About 290 of these are pensioner flats owned by the Whanganui District Council. Many of the tenants are not likely to be connected to the internet or not have the skills and confidence. Assisting these people will benefit

He argues that "We need to get some action organised urgently now. Unfortunately, local authorities and central governments take years to respond to demand. However, digital technology especially artificial intelligence is evolving so quickly that by the time needs are appropriately recognized and actioned it is/will be too late.

Alistair says, "We are lucky in Whanganui to have some extremely talented digital 'players'. It is great see a new Whanganui Tech Network group start in 2023. The future is digital, so digital inclusion and digital equity must be given plenty attention to ensure EVERYONE can reach their potential to be successful."

# ASK A PROFESSIONAL

#### When to call the after-hours vet

Pets do not live by a convenient schedule; many become unwell during an evening or over a weekend when the vet clinic is closed and owners have to decide when to call the after-hours vet. In general, any sudden, severe illness including tremors, sudden bloating, persistent seizures, vomiting, severe bleeding, or collapse needs to be seen immediately, as do pets straining to wringte (especially male cats) and females struggling to give high

urinate (especially male cats) and females struggling to give birth.

Many other problems can wait, especially if the symptoms are mild or have been present already for a long time and have not suddenly worsened. If you are concerned about your pet after-hours, your veterinarian can provide advice over the phone and help you to decide if your pet can wait to be seen until open hours.

Remember, it is easier and safer to treat most conditions earlier, before the symptoms worsen, so calling your vet as soon as you are concerned is often your safest option.

The dress selected for February is made from a self-striped cotton muslin that has been printed with six colours, using a mix of rolling and hand block-

Kaihāpai Taonga/Collections and Curatorial Lead, Trish Nugent-Lyne said the origin of the dress is unknown. "A label inside tells me that this dress came from the Wanganui Repertory Theatre, so we are not sure who the original owner or wearer was,

but we know that she was tiny. She would have been 5ft or less (about 150cm) and with a 21-inch (53cm) waist." The dress is entirely hand

# Practical recipes for the Bouquet of the Week summer season

Gina Guigou has

has offered to write a series of practical recipes
using summer season
products. This one is
about making plum jam
using plums from your
own tree, your neighbour's or a friend's tree.

The summer season is well upon us, and plums have had a slow start but are now starting to ripen.

While we enjoy eating sun-ripened plums off the tree, there are always more than what we can consume, so it is a great time to make jam, sauce and stew for later in the year.

Making jam is a good way to recycle some of those glass jars everyone seems to collect. It is very important to ensure that the jars we use are suitable.

What to look for to ensure the glass jar and the lid are suitable to use:

• Jar has no chips along the rim so the lid will seal.



• Jar is spotlessly clean on the inside so that the jam doesn't become contaminated and goes off.

• Metal lids can be reused if the rubber seal inside the lid is of good quality and there are no rust marks on the lid.

• Lids need to have a tight fit to the jar.

Preparing jars and

lids to be used when your jam is ready to be sterilised.

Wash your jars in hot, soapy water, and place them upside down in an oven and heat at 180 C for 10 minutes. You will need to use a dry cloth to remove the jars from the oven. Another option is to place the jars on a

towel and then fill them up with boiling water. Put lids in a pot with water covering them, then bring the water to the boil. They can be left to cool in the water, then placed on the jars of jam while still hot.

Next week, Gina will write about the process of making the jam.

# at Paris Olympics



The Routliffe/Hourigan combination lost in the quarter-finals in Auckland.

Turakina-born tennis player Paige Hourigan will focus on doubles for the next six months in a quest to play at the Paris Olympics. She partnered with US Open doubles champion Erin Routliffe at the ASB Classic with the hope was that it will help them get to Paris.

Routliffe's usual doubles partner, Gabby Dabrowski from Canada, didn't want to play in the first week of the year, which left Routliffe to find someone to team up with. Hourigan hadn't played since March because of an injury but had recently started training, and her focus will be on doubles to increase her chances of getting her ranking high enough to play with Routliffe at the Games.

If that happens, Routliffe will also be able to partner up with Michael Venus for the mixed doubles.

To play at the Olympics together, Routliffe and Hourigan will have to not only reach the International Olympic

Committee's requirements but also get approval from the NZ Olympic Committee. Tennis NZ will need to convince the NZOC that they have the potential to reach the last 16 in Paris.

Although 26-year-old Hourigan is a skilled doubles player and is a former finalist at the Classic, injuries have meant she hasn't played much tennis over the past three years, and a Routliffe/Hourigan partnership may not be seen as one of the favourite teams to win a medal.

However, a Routliffe/Venus combina-tion would be one of the strongest for the mixed doubles.

Under the IOC's rules, Routliffe can't go to the Olympics just to play mixed doubles. She is looking to play a few other Women's Tennis Association tournaments with Hourigan this year to help her get her ranking up. The Olympic cut off is in June when the rankings will be

park area near the end of Mitchell Streett in Aramoho. However, it is not a park to take kids for a game of footie or cricket as it is very much over-grown. A local phoned us up saying that "The park hasn't been mowed since late last year and as a result the long grass is encouraging rodents, is a fire risk and a health hazard especially for asthma and hav fever sufferers.'

We asked Whanganui District Council what is happening and we got the following response from Council's general manager, community, property and places, Sarah O'Hagan:

"Te Mana Park is a 'low-mow' area. A number of councils have introduced low-mow areas because leaving grass to grow longer is good for the environment as it attracts beneficial insects and reduces mowing costs.
"Te Mana Park was se-

lected as a low mow area because it's naturally a very wet area, and it's difficult to take mowing machinery into the park in winter. The main part of Te Mana Park is mown once a year, and in summer, a pathway is mown through and around it.

Contractors mow around the boundary of the park to keep the grass down immediately adjacent to residential ar-

eas.
"Debris from cutting firewood had been left at one of the park entrances before Christmas the grass was unable to be mown – this has now been cleared and the entrance will be mown when contractors visit the park during the week of 22-26 January.

"A sign indicating the park is a low mow area has been removed from the park entrance and will be reinstated."

This approach is unlikely to satisfy those who live close to the park and would like to use it more often, especially in sum-

**Gateway Programme** The Gateway programme helps students in Years 11 - 13 progress from school to workplace learning

in a range of industries and business around NZ, while they continue to study at school.

**Industry training** Industry training is learning on the job, from traditional trades like building and plumbing

through to government and community services. It provides employees with structured training, so employees can earn while they learn. This is coordinated by Industry Training Organisations (ITOs) around NZ

If your child is changing school or kura for any reason, you need to let the school know they are leaving and which school they will be going to and make sure they are enrolled in their new school. This includes moving to a new primary school, kura, intermediate or secondary school.

Once your child is enrolled at a new school, all their personal records will be sent from the previous

#### How do I enrol my child? What paperwork do I need to provide?

You enrol directly with the school or kura. Contact them to find out their enrolment process and to get their enrolment forms.

#### Documents for enrolling

Check with the school or kura to see what paperwork they want. They will want things like:

- · a copy of your child's birth certificate or passport as proof of age
- a copy of their immunisation certificate (this is in the back of your Well Child book or ask your family doctor for a copy)
- · medical information including your doctor's contact details
- · any legal documents, for example custody or access agreements the school should know about
- · if your child has been enrolled in early childhood education, their National Student Number (NSN). and ECE leaver's record
- · contact details your family phone numbers and address and someone the school or kura can call in an emergency if they can't get hold of you.

#### Can I enrol my child at any school I like?

Not always.

If the school has an 'enrolment scheme', in other words, is zoned, this gives them the authority to restrict enrolments to families living within the zone. If you want your child to attend a zoned school and you live outside the zone you will have to apply to go into their ballot. You can read more about ballots and zones.

If you live in an area that has a choice of more than one school you can find can apply to enrol. out what some of your different options might be by reading the section on the

#### different types of schools available. What if a school refuses to enrol my child?

First of all, contact the school and ask whether they have an enrolment

# What does your child learn in Secondary School?

You will find that what (and how) your child learns at secondary school is quite different to when you were at school. Nowadays the focus is on developing a range of skills and abilities that they need to continue their education, get into the career they want and be successful in life, rather than just teaching facts and figures.

State and state-integrated schools and kura use the National Curriculum as a framework to develop teaching programmes that are relevant to their students. Primary schools and kura begin delivering the National Curriculum and secondary schools continue it at the higher levels.

#### What will my child learn in years 9 and 10?

These are the first two years of secondary school. In these years your child will learn English, maths, science, health and physical education, social sciences and can choose from a range of options across the arts and technology. Optional subjects may also include languages, economics and textiles.

Schools and kura can

vary in the optional subjects they offer so ask your child's teacher or dean or check the school or kura website for more information on the options they

In the senior years your child will specialise in subjects that fit with their interests and abilities and their tertiary education and career plans. During this time there's a greater choice of subjects but the teaching is still guided by the National Curriculum. The subjects your child takes in these years will be assessed in relation to

will require your child to study the core subjects of English, maths and science, although there may be a variety of classes they can take in these subjects. As well as these core subjects your child will take 3 other subjects. English and maths credits are reguired for NCEA Level 1.

In most schools in year 12 English is a compulsory subject and in year 13 there are usually no compulsory subjects. Your child can choose what they study from the subject areas offered by the school or kura or if a subject they're interested in learning is not offered, they can talk to the school about doing the subject through Te Kura (The Correspondence School) or through a neighbouring school.

New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) can help with information on the subjects available at secondary school and are your first stop for information about NCEA. Find out all about NCEA from the NZQA website, ( www. nzqa.govt.nz /audiencepages/parents/) is also a NZQA NCEA Guide mobile app you can download.


I attended a programme intended as a lead into the series on the Human Brain. The topic was 'How our brains make our emotions.' It was interest-

# Do more in 2024

## NZ's oldest festival of sports, music and Volunteers needed for Whanganui dance at Turakina this Saturday

The Turakina Highland Games returns this Saturday, 27 January, at the Turakina Domain. First held in 1864, it is New Zealand's oldest festival of sports, music and dance. Apart from when Covid prevented it from running one year, the Games have run for 159 years, including last year when they got through some torrential rain.

Debbie and Durry Benton have been with the organising team for over ten years, with Durry being the chief of the Turakina Caledonian So-

Debbie says, "We have a record number of High-land dancers this year with 137 entries from all over the country." The Games are regarded as one of the most significant Highland events in New Zealand. Of those 137, 110 have entered into the Royal Scottish Official Board of Highland Dancing competi-tions while the other 27 are competing in the New Zealand Piping and Dancing competitions.

Entries into the solo piping competitions is likewise huge, with 70 including competitors those at the highest level. Then of course there are





the Highland drummers

In the afternoon it will be the chance for pipe bands to show off. One band to focus on will be the Manawatu Scottish Band who competed in the World Championships in Edinburgh, Scotland, last year achieving a 9th place position, the high-est of any band outside of Scotland.

In between times there

be the traditional field events such as the shot put, tossing the caand if that is too heavy for you, what about tossing the hay bale with a pitch fork. There is also another event involving running with heavy rocks. What next?

In the children's section, it will be a return to some good old fashioned races, such as paddy (potato not egg) and spoon, the nee-dle in a haystack for prizes (no hay fever sufferers should enter), the three legged and the sack races.

If by lunchtime you are thinking, 'I should give ....a go', you can, as younger band members will show you how. This could be the first day of your future in pipe bands.

What about a photo wearing a kilt to bring out the inner Scot in all of us? There will be a range of kilts, although regrettably not the best of all – the 'Davidson' kilt.

There will also be a Clan march past at lunch time so if you have a Scottish surname, be prepared to

What would be a festival without food - and there will be plenty including haggis to try (much better than a sausage).

Near the end there will

be a haggis ceremony with whisky (sorry - only for the formal partici-pants), followed by the prize giving and then a BBQ dinner, which will cost you only \$15 (12 and

under \$7). All Highland Games have to end with a free cèilidh or party, and Turakina will have the band 'Bowmore' (coincidentally the name of a recommended Scotch single malt whisky) playing. Debbie advises "There will be traditional dances with the more 'mature' participants able to show the young ones what to do," as well as some 'more recent dance forms.

The gate fee is \$10 for adults with children under 15 free. Parking is free all day with the option of camping at only \$5 per night, plus gate fee.

# Staying cool at home this summer

simple, effective and low-cost ways to reduce the temperature of your home - without using electricity.

Here are some simple tips to take the heat out of your home when designing, building or renovating.

Insulate well -

Insulation regulates the transfer of heat into and out of a home. It helps to keep your home warm in winter by reducing the amount of heat that escapes, and it also helps to keep your home cooler in summer. Ceiling insulation is especially effective - it reduces the amount of radiant heat absorbed into your home by roofing iron and tiles

and buffers the ceiling cavity, which is often extremely hot, from the rooms below. Wall insulation is important too (you can also use heat-absorbing materials like concrete or bricks for north- and westfacing walls).

Allow for good airflow - The simplest way to cool a home is to open doors and windows, allowing air to circulate. This is particularly effective if cool air from shaded areas around the home can be drawn inside. Installing window-stays means you can leave windows partially open at night, or when you are out, without compromising security. Even better, if you are

windows, consider frames with built-in air

It is especially useful to open high-level windows on hot days this enables the rising warm air to escape. If renovating or building a new home, be sure to include openable, highlevel windows in the

design.

Provide adequate
shading - Wide eaves
keep the sun out of your home in summer but let in the low winter sun. Alternatively, removable awnings or shade sails can be erected in summer and taken down in winter. Pergolas around north- and west-facing doors and windows, planted with

vines, are a great idea, too. The abundant leaves in summer provide welcome shade, but when the leaves fall, winter sunlight will enter.

deciduous

Skylights are a wonderful way to introduce natural

light and warmth into darker areas of a home. but during summer months they can act as heaters, raising

indoor temperatures to unbearable levels. Install blinds or screens on skylights and draw

these in the hottest parts of the day.

## Decks and paving areas for outdoor living

Paved areas play a special role in summer garden spaces. They are particularly useful in areas of high traffic. For instance, the threshold between house and garden needs a hard-wearing surface to cope with the intensity of traffic. Paving also carries the eyes from the house out to the garden. It is a half-way space.

By itself paving can be hot and glaring during the middle of summer. Small courtyards often depend on water in some form to counter this harshness and make the space more livable. Another method is to use pergolas draped with climbing plants to create a shaded space. Deciduous climbers, in particular, make paving areas useful sun traps during winter when we crave the sun's warmth, and

create pools of shade during summer.

Paving stores the sun's heat during the day and radiates it back at night, making a paved area very pleasant for entertain-

Decks are also useful summer places. These also deal with high traffic areas, and can provide a level living area on sloping ground. They are most commonly attached to a house as a transition space to the rest of the garden. However, they can also be used as a free standing summer space remote from the house, particularly to make use of an area of sloping ground.
Use pine (radiata or macrocarpa) or

When painting above your head with a brush, paint tends to drop down the brush onto your hand To avoid this, put a small hole in an ice-cream container lid and place the handle of the brush through the hole. You won't get any paint on your hands as it will go onto the lid. Once you have finished the job you can clean and reuse the lid. From: Nicola Patterson.

We have a "New Denim Blue" coloured iron fence around our barbecue area. I could only purchase green coloured hanging baskets to hang on the iron fence, so I purchased some New Denim Blue paint from the local Resene ColorShop and painted the hanging baskets to match the fence. In fact, when I took them back to the garden shop to get plants for the baskets, the shop suggested I could paint some for sale in the shops as so many people ask for different coloured hanging baskets. If repainting a previously painted surface, use a common kitchen scourer to both clean and roughen the surface. In many situations it will save you needing to sand before painting, and quite a bit of elbow grease. From: Perry Shilton.

Store paint tins upside down (check the lid is on tightly!) to prevent a skin forming on the paint surface. From: Stephanie Lee.

Always cover everything in the room you are working in. Never think when sanding that because the Tv and video are on the other side of the room that you don't need to cover them, as the dust will find its way to them and may ruin them.. From: Adele Rohriach.



#### Beware of fishing licence website

Fish & Game New Zealand is urging anglers to beware of an overseas-based website offering its services to help purchase a fishing licence.

The Fish Assistant website, which is not authorised by Fish & Game NZ, offers anglers fishing licences at a significantly higher cost to the user than purchasing a

licence through the Fish & Game website.

Anglers have reported being significantly overcharged or not receiving the licence they have paid for, which poses a real risk for anglers when they get approached by our compliance team in the field as they

may be fishing illegally.

Fish Assistant has also altered fishing licences, (an offence under the Freshwater Fishing Regulations) to remove the purchase price in an effort to prevent anglers from knowing the actual costs of purchasing them from Fish & Game.

Fish & Game believes approximately 150 fishing licences have been purchased through the Fish Assistant

website.
"There is only one authorised place to purchase your fishing licence online, and that's the Fish & Game NZ

website," says Corina Jordan, chief executive of Fish & Game.

"We re concerned those people looking to buy a licence will pay a premium through the Fish Assistant website when they can easily buy one online for a reasonable price through Fish & Game. People can also purchase a licence in-store at one of our partner retail

"We're disappointed this website is pulling the wool over people s eyes by suggesting it is difficult to purchase a fishing licence in New Zealand when it is, in fact, very simple and quick. Fish & Game also has teams around the country who are happy to provide ree advice and information."

We are also very concerned that Angler's credit card details have been compromised, as the website is not processing these payments through an accredited payment system.

Fish & Game has been liaising with the Department of Conservation, which is also affected by this website and recommends anyone who has used the fish assistant website to contact the NZ Police and their bank.


