## Lessons learnt while working on plumbing projects in Cambodia

Jared Wood from Bio Flow Plumbing spent a couple of years living and working for aid organisations in Cambodia, and his experiences overseas gave him a different perspective on life and work.

Feeling inspired to use his skills for meaningful ventures, Jared returned to New Zealand before opting to go to Cambodia, which he chose "because it was not too extreme. relatively close and easy to get to." Using his savings and money he had

"80% of Cambodians did not have access to proper sanitation," he explains, "and the organisation was putting in a latrine, a flush toilet - but only into a type of long drop.

His question was – what was to happen after a year when the long drop was full? What do you do with the waste apart from trying to pump it back into open fields, with the likelihood of spreading disease?

As part of the project Jared went to the Philippines and then to South Africa to find out how they were tackling similar issues. His conclusion He wanted to work in a was that it would be necessary to suction out the after working in the famwaste and transport it to

could potentially include worms.

But such a proposal would be very expensive in comparison to putting in more latrines. "Aid agencies seemed to want to fly their flag. They would rather boast to their donors that they had put in 1000 new latrines than to do something sustainable with the waste being created. They had good intentions but a lack of focus on sustainable solutions. It was a case of we'll figure it out later."

By this stage, he was living on a tight budget eating, out most days for the equivalent of no more than \$1. While he was 'grateful for all the experiences that had provided me with so much," it was time to come back to New Zealand.

He worked on organic farms and studied permaculture upon his return. more meaningful way, and ily's plumbing business, some form of low-tech he transitioned to setting



up his own - Bio Flow Plumbing.

Jared and his partner Stacy came to live in Whanganui and to set up his business here. All the time, he continues to explore ways to lighten his impact on the earth while helping his clients to do the same, as well as ways he can contribute back to the lo-

cal community in meaningful ways. Recently, he spoke at the February meeting of Green Drinks on how to reduce your environmental impact on everything from hot and cold water, hard and soft water to eco toilets, composting toilets, household moisture and home heating solutions.

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## Special Songbird concert at Bushy Park on March 10

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## Public could help solve Whanganui Boost to rural internet mass fish death mystery

The public is being asked to provide crucial, 'as-it-happens' evidence that could help identify the cause of mass fish deaths in the Whanganui River catchment

Mass deaths of tuna/eels and other fish have been reported in the upper Whanganui River over previous years, usually in summer.

Iwi, the Department of Conservation, the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI), Horizons Regional Council, Genesis, and Fish and Game are banding together to get to the bottom of this problem.

Jane Taylor, River Restoration Ranger at DOC, says, finding the cause of the mass fish deaths is like a 'whodunit' investigation.

"We need teamwork to solve this mystery. It's especially important because the long-fin eel, one of the species in the catchment, is at risk of extinction.'

The public are asked to report any observations of sick, dead, or dying fish to MPI's pest and disease hotline (0800 80 99 66).

Dr Mike Taylor, Team Manager Aquatic Health at Biosecurity New Zealand (within MPI). asks people to make the reports as soon as possible after sighting.

"Please take photos and report the location, date, number, and type of species, and how fresh they are. This will help us consider whether there are suitable specimens to test for diseases.'

MPI will test some of the fish specimens to try and determine the cause of death, Horizons Regional Council will gather more environmental data, and mana whenua and Fish & Game will add their data, observations and local knowledge to the mix.

Chair of Te Mana o Ngā Tuna, Ben Potaka, says mana whenua have been concerned for years about the annual mass deaths of tuna in the Whanganui, but until now, nothing seems to have been done about it.

"Tuna are significant taonga. It's time for everybody to all pull together to try and understand the cause of these mass fish deaths."

Last summer there were no reports of the mass deaths of tuna. However, previous years have seen reports of dead and lethargic tuna from the Manganui o te Ao River and the Whanganui River, as far downstream as Pipiriki.

Maree Patterson, Senior Water Quality Scientist at Horizons Regional Council says the cause of these deaths is not clear.

"Previous mass deaths events tended to be widespread, indicating they weren't the result of a single pollution event. Water temperatures probably

aren't a factor as temperatures in the major rivers don't get hot enough to cause fish deaths directly.

"We're extending our existing monitoring programmes in the Whanganui catchment, by installing new monitoring equipment at Pipiriki and Wades Landing to continuously measure dissolved oxygen levels in the water over warm, dry

periods."

The expectation is that through this monitoring work, there'll be better information to understand the mass fish deaths and determine ways to reduce or prevent them in the future. People are advised to exercise common sense and not take dead or dying fish to eat while the cause of their deaths is undetermined.

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# connectivity on SH4



Whanganui MP Carl Bates is delighted that a 7.1 kilometre mobile black spot on State Highway Four has been eliminated.

'Media and Communications Minister Hon Melissa Lee advised me that the mobile tower had gone live today," Carl said.

The tower, located at the Maewa Trig between Otoko and Kakatahi, is the product of a partnership between the Rural Connectivity Group (RCG), Crown Infrastructure Partners (formerly Crown Fibre Holdings) and the Whanganui District Council

Crown Fibre Holdings was established by the former National-led government to manage the rollout of ultrafast broadband and was renamed in September 2017.

Today's development is part of the Government's Rural Connectivity Programme.

In addition to the 7.1km on State Highway Four, 10.1 kilometres of surrounding local roads will also

become connected.

Carl said the new tower will also enable motorists to connect to the 111 emergency service no matter which network they belong to.

"This development will be of huge benefit to the rural community in this

"In my maiden speech three weeks ago, I referred to rural connectivity being a real issue for the Whanganui, South Taranaki and Stratford districts."

Whanganui Mayor Andrew Tripe says, "I am quick to remind people that Whanganui District is both urban and rural, including many living in isolated areas. It is then critical that mobile coverage right across our District is there for all our community and I very much welcome the announcement by Minster Lee."

Carl said, "The Coalition Government is committed to improving connectivity for rural New Zealand, and I will be advocating strongly for those areas in the Whanganui electorate that still suffer from inferior connectivity or worse, none whatsoever."



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## NZ Blood Service lifts 'mad cow' restriction

From today, Thursday 29 February 2024, people who lived in the United Kingdom, France or Republic of Ireland between 1980 and 1996 for six months or more during the 'mad cow disease' outbreak will finally be able to book to donate blood or plasma in New Zealand.

"It has taken some time for us to reach this point, but after more than 20 years, we are thrilled that we can safely remove this restriction and finally welcome this large cohort of new potential donors into our lifesaving whānau," says New Zealand Blood Service (NZBS) Chief Executive Sam Cliffe.

"It's impossible to say how many people living in New Zealand have been prevented from donating because of this.

However, we estimate that we lost around eight to 10 percent of donors when this restriction was introduced.

"No doubt people will be eager to donate straightaway. Given the influx of new donors we're expecting to welcome through our doors from Thursday 29 February 2024, we're asking people to consider booking an appointment over the next few weeks. This will ensure the donation process runs as smoothly as possible for them and avoid overwhelming our donor centres or mobile drives."

The restriction that prevented those who lived in the United Kingdom, France, or Republic of Ireland between 1980 and 1996 for six months or more from donating was implemented in 2000.

It was a precautionary measure in response to the outbreak of 'mad cow' disease and concerns about the risk of acquiring human variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (vCJD) via blood or plasma transfusions.

The recommendation from NZBS to lift the restriction was approved by Medsafe following a review and detailed risk assessment.

NZBS' clinical team worked with epidemiology and infectious disease experts at the University of New South Wales Kirby Institute for more than a year to research the risk of vCJD among New Zealand's blood donor population.

That work showed the risk was negligible and that removing the restriction would not comprise the safety of blood and

blood products in New Zealand.

With those previously impacted by the restriction finally being able to book an appointment to donate from Thursday 29 February 2024, they'll first be encouraged to check their eligibility online because there may be other factors that mean they're unable to give blood or much needed plasma. A basic eligibility quiz can be found on the NZBS website.

"This is an exciting time for everyone. Our teams are looking forward to welcoming all new donors into our lifesaving donor community from Thursday 29 February 2024."

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

Margaret Austin (formerly Gay Davison) was born in Palmerston North in the 1940s and attended Palmerston North Girls' High School and Victoria University of Wellington. "It was that wonderful feeling of connecting with the people in our area, seeing the benefits of a neighbourhood that interacts with each other, providing a sense of community and safety, that made me really

keen to work with Neighbours Aotearoa and see other people enjoying similar neighbourhood vibes.

"The benefits of feeling connected and part of a community are well documented. It helps to tackle loneliness, increases feelings of wellbeing and safety. Often people want those benefits but they're not sure where to start.

"My role is to increase awareness around the initiative, but also to provide ideas on how people can get involved, linking people with some of the tools we have available to help bring their ideas to life.

"Participation can be as big or small as you like. It could be as simple as waving or greeting a neighbour for the first time, sharing excess veges from the gar-

den over the fence, an invitation to a shared walk, or a bigger event such as a street BBQ, street garage sale or crop swap. We are encouraging people to register their participation on our website if they do have something planned. It helps us to hear about all the great things people are doing, no matter how small or big, it also gives others ideas for things they can do to get involved"

Playing a pivotal role in

Vesak celebrations, these lanterns transform the streets into a captivating visual spectacle with hundreds of paper lanterns and lights. Symbolizing the Light of Buddha, Dharma (his teachings), and Sangha (his disciples), the lanterns come in diverse shapes, colours, and sizes, contributing to

the festive ambience. In the days leading up to Vesak, families engage in the preparation of lanterns in their homes, and communities often collaborate to create larger-scale lanterns. Additionally, it is customary during this period to provide free vegetarian food to the public. Dan Sala, small food stalls offering complimentary meals, can be found lining the streets

of Sri Lanka during the Vesak festival.

The Workshop: Owing to time constraints, the lantern frames for the workshop will be prepared earlier, ready to be decorated by attendees on the day. Two facilitators will be on hand to assist participants, and an instruction leaflet detailing the structure-making process will be provided.

As an added treat, they'll be offering Sri Lankan nibbles during the workshop. While the event is free of charge, they welcome Koha contributions, which will support future events.



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
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The purpose of World Book Day on Thursday, 7 March, is to promote reading, publishing and copyright. The day will consist of a celebration of books and reading, and children will be encouraged to come to school dressed up as their favourite characters from literature.

It was first organised in 1995, and it is promoted by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Organisation (UNESCO), which also helps to select a World Book Capital for one year. That city carries out a programme of activities to celebrate and promote books and reading. In 2023, Accra, the capital of Ghana, was designated as the World Book Capital.

Strasbourg, France, has been designated as the World Book Capital for 2024. The city's strong focus on books, its commitment to addressing social tensions and climate change through programmes like 'Reading for the Planet,' and its emphasis on encouraging debate and discussion of environmental concerns make it a fitting choice.

In the UK and Ireland, children are encouraged to explore the pleasures of

books and reading by being given the opportunity to buy from a collection of special books priced at the equivalent of just NZ\$2. Those in primary school are given a book voucher to buy one of these books or to put towards the cost of any other book. The offer is sponsored by major supermarkets and large bookshop chains.

The original idea of a World Book Day was conceived in 1922 by Vicente Clavel, director of Cervantes Publishing House in Barcelona, to honour the author Miguel de Cervantes and boost the sales





tated. The longest stretch was spent in Hawera, where she attended Hawera Primary School. Her secondary schooling took place at St Mary's Diocesan School for Girls in Stratford, where she was immersed in languages, which she continued at Victoria University earning her BA with a double major in French and English Literature.

She gained a scholarship for further study at the Sorbonne in France, but chose marriage instead. With her marriage came three much-loved sons. Rhys, Tony and Sam.

Some years later, Kerry gained Postgraduate Diplomas in Social Sciences, Second-Language Teaching. Her teaching career began in 1976 when she was asked to fill in for a temporary vacancy in the History Department at Wanganui Girl's College. She had never taught before and discovered that she loved it, developing a Socratic method which involves an investigative dialogue between teacher and students.

In 1981 she began teaching at Whanganui Collegiate, and she loved those years, becoming the first female Head of the History Department. During this period, she had an exchange with Reigate Grammar in England, where a star pupil was British comedian, David Walliams.

Kerry travelled extensively, visiting forty different countries in all. Ethiopia was dear to her, as she spent time there researching the life of Captain Tristram Speedy, adventurer and explorer, and Kerry's distant relation.

Four years were spent in Japan teaching English, during which time she escorted her Japanese students on tours to Whanganui. She had

time in Japan, because she was always an object of curiosity by virtue of both her height and the fact that she was a European living in a largely rural area. Nonetheless, she made some lifelong friendships there, and loved the country's language, history and culture.

Kerry will also be remembered for her strong connection to the Repertory Theatre. Her varied roles included actor, director and Vice-President. As an actress she won hearts, along with Lynn Taylor, in their award-winning performance of Peter Shaffer's Lettice and Lovage. Kerry's interpretations of

Madame Arcati in Blithe Spirit, and Lady Bracknell in The Importance of Being Earnest were perfecmixed feelings about her tion, and her recent role

as the eponymous, Lady in the Van, was a tour de force, sadly the last. As a director for plays such as Shona M Wilson's Direct Hit, Roger Hall's Middle Age Spread and Tom Scott's Daylight Atheist, she drew the very best out of her cast, and was always ready, as a mentor, to take on untried scripts to give new and local playwrights a chance to see their words come to life on the stage.

As if she did not have

enough to do, Kerry also won an award for her restoration of a heritage building in Victoria Ave, transforming a run-down edifice into a magnificent inner-city apartment.

Kerry made her final exit on the evening of 23 February. A service to celebrate her incredible life will be held on Friday, 1 March, at Collegiate Chapel, Liverpool Street.



Key themes for this year's curated selection are Korean Cinema, 70s sci-fi films, and 80s comedies.



## Core boards installed at Kowhai Park for people with speech or language trouble

A new community resource has been installed at Whanganui's Kowhai Park to help people with verbal communication and encourage active and inclusive participation in play.

Core communication boards - known as core boards – are large signs with pictorial images and words that provide visual communication for people of all ages who have trouble with speech or language skills. They help people to make requests and share how they're feeling.

The installation of core boards in parks and play spaces is a relatively new initiative by the TalkLink

increase nonverbal communication throughout Aotearoa, New Zealand. Whanganui resident Kori Mako and Lorraine Russell, head teacher at Central Kindergarten Keith Street, made the

suggestion to install core boards at Kowhai Park to Mayor Andrew Tripe. Mayor Andrew says, "I

was initially approached by Kori with the idea to install core boards in Kowhai Park so that she and her son could better communicate while they played at the

"Core boards are a great initiative to make members of our non-verbal community feel acknowledged and rides to point to, such as valued in our public spaces, and they fit perfectly with ongoing Whanganui District Council funding for greater accessibility at our playgrounds and parks," he

"On behalf of our community, I thank the Talk-Link Trust for their advocacy and the creative vision that's led to the installation of these valuable augmented communication signs."

The core boards - one in te reo Māori, the other in English - have been installed along the pathway within the park's playground. The boards feature illustrations of playground

tārere-swing, retiretislide and tīemiemi-seesaw, alongside symbols and terms for activities and actions like reri-ready, huriturn, inu-drink and kai-eat, as well as tauanga (numbers) and symbols for ana

/kāore (yes/no). People can point to the cil. illustrations and symbols to convey what activity they'd like to do, and the

words can then be spoken by others to emphasise the activity or action.

Another core board is planned for Lorenzdale Park in Gonville as part of an upgrade to this park The core boards have been funded and installed by Whanganui District Coun-
